Dear Friends,

As the Summer turns to Fall, we are grateful for our District's open spaces, and trails that can be accessed and enjoyed year-round. Visitors can experience our fog-touched parks and trails along the coast or travel only a few miles from the coast to our majestic inland parks that are seasonally cooler or warmer. MPRPD offers trails which range from sea level to 2,000 ft. in elevation with paths that take the traveler through the dunes to the beaches, across streams, vernal ponds, into redwood shaded canyons, and all the way to mountain tops boasting amazing views of valleys and spanning across the Monterey Bay Sanctuary.

Our District team hopes visitors are enjoying our newly constructed facilities at Palo Corona Regional Park that includes a picnic area, shaded seating, bus landings, restrooms, and improved accessibility. We appreciate your patience as we finish up final work on these facilities taking extra steps to protect sensitive habitat and species, all while keeping the trails and facilities open for use.

Behind the scenes, District staff have partnered with other organizations and individuals to develop curricula, protect critical resources, and improve trail networks. Staff are also initiating a transportation grant, creating interactive exhibits, and expanding offerings of free, fun, and educational programs throughout the district serving all age groups.

We are grateful for our communities' support over the years and are excited to announce a new way to donate to programs and activities of the District. In partnership with the Community Foundation of Monterey County, a Let's Go Outdoors! Fund has been established. This special-purpose fund, for charitable gifts and public contributions, can be used to support projects like the future Palo Corona Regional Park off-leash dog area, district-wide fire management and mitigation preparedness, volunteer and stewardship management, capital improvement projects, educational, cultural, and historical programs, and more.

Get to Know Your MPRPD Parks

Palo Corona Cabin and Orchard

Only accessible through MPRPD, this all day, strenuous nature hike will lead you to a small hunting cabin and nearby orchard that still stand as remnants of the former ranch's agricultural past. Instructor: MPRPD Volunteer Naturalists.

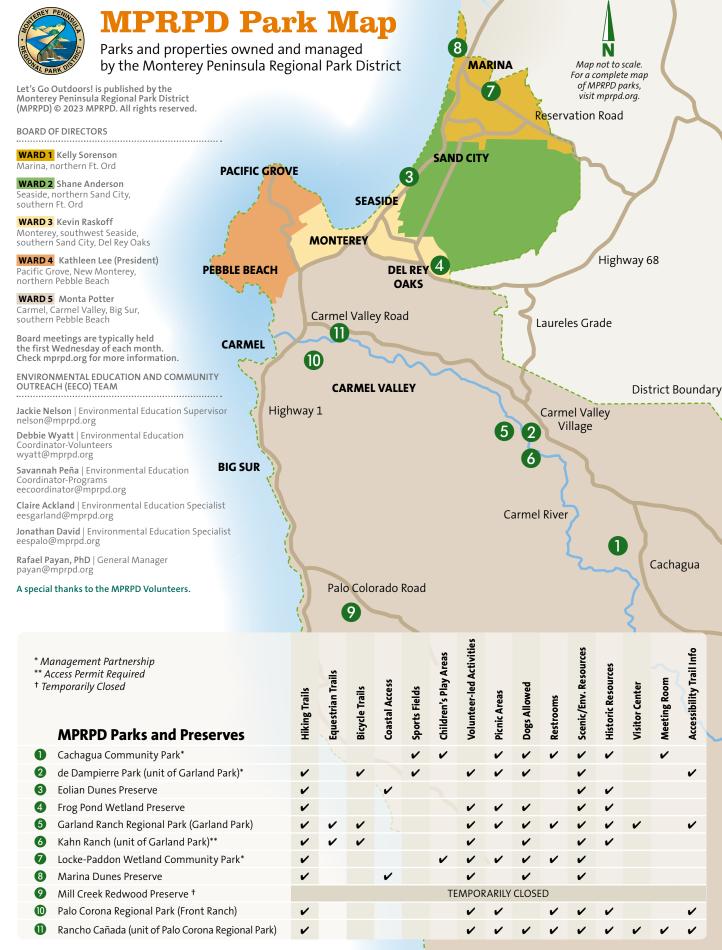
